



* Klaus Hueneke (author of "Huts of the High Country") has written a new book, "KIANDRA TO KOSCIUSKO" in which he sets out to record journeys on foot, ski, horseback and pushbike to the high country. The 300 page book covers the visits by aboriginals looking for fat Bogong Moths, the early European explorers, the stockmen seeking summer grazing and the recreational users.

- Another publication which has come out is Charles Warner's "Exploring Queensland's Central Highlands", RRP \$13.95. The main focus of the book is on Carnarvon Gorge National Park, but also covers five other parks and reserves in the central highlands.
- Steve Tremont and Barry Higgins intend to traverse the length of the Great Dividing Range from western Victoria to Cape York in the near future. They have established some 118 food dumps along the 6700 km route which they hope to complete in about 430 days.

Steve has catered for 16 different breakfasts and 24 different main meals which has lead to some interesting bulk buying - like 63 kg of Milo, and \$85 worth of garlic flakes. Barry is Distribution Manager at Paddys, and Steve is a past employee.

Vale - Eric Dark

As a sickly youth taken to the countryside to improve his health, Eric Dark was allowed to wander freely round the town of Bungonia. These adventures round the top of the Shoalhaven Gorge wetted his appetite, so he in 1907 set off with Ralph Blackett to canoe down the Shoalhaven River.

Drought conditions and unfamiliarity with the country made an epic of the trip. Thus their twenty three day journey would appear to be the first recorded long river trip in NSW.

When he graduated from medical school, Dr. Dark saw military service in France during the First World War, then in 1922 settled in the Blue Mountains. He resumed his rock scrambling and formed the Blue Mountaineers rock climbing club in 1929. His wife, Eleanor (the historical novelist), participated in these climbing sorties.

His first climbing trip to the Warrumbungles occurred in 1932/3 and for several years thereafter returned to the area. In 1936 the party included Marie Byles and introduced her friend Dot English (later Butler) to rockclimbing.

By this stage Dr. Dark was nearly fifty years of age and so he decided to give rock climbing away. Dot induced her walking companions to take up this new activity, from which the Sydney Rockclimbing Club was to eventually spring.

Eric Dark was accused of 'alleged militant tendencies' and this lead to much disruption to his political and private life.

A few years ago I met Dr. Dark as he was nursing his wife through her long illness. Instead of a radical, I found a quiet and compassaionate man. It was a little hard to believe that this frail and elderly gentleman had been canoeing and climbing so long ago, and had listed these activities his pastimes in his entry in Who's Who.

Search and Rescue had a successful year - few incidents! There were a number of overdue club trips, as usual, but none required S & R's services.

There were two callouts during the year. In September 1986 S & R found an overdue party in Claustral Canyon. This was a particularly dangerous search as the flooded canyon did not stop rising all day. The heavy rain that continued on from the day before posed a potential exposure threat. I was proud of the excellent work done by the clubs chosen to assist.

The second callout in November, 1986 was much easier. A senior citizen was safely located off the Benowie Track. As a result of this callout the Sydney Morning Herald did an excellent article on bush safety featuring S & R.

There was the ususal three training excersises all of which were different. A feature of these excersises has been the First Aid talks given by Doctor Doug Wheen - watch out for his promised notes in "The Bushwalker".

The Rock Rescue Squad is upgrading its standard and has commenced training up to the level of RESCUE OPERATOR under the Australian Lightweight Vertical Rescue Scheme.

In January 1987, the Minister for Police and Emergency Services suggested that "foolish persons be made to pay for their own rescue". This naturally worries S & R and the Federation as we are unsure as to what constitutes foolish actions - some say that's bushwalking! Bush rescue also tends to get wide media coverage because of its difficulty and rarity. Car accidents kill over 2500 Australians every year but are too common to be newsworthy anymore.

S & R on behalf of the Federation has written to the Minister on the safe way bushwalking is done in clubs. It is also seeking an interview with the Minister to clarify his attitude to bushwalking.

All clubs need to review their safety training so as not to create an incident that will bring discredit to the clubs of The Federation. In particular trip details must be left with someone responsible at home. One club (no names) recently had an overdue trip and could not give the names of all persons on the trip and exact route details! Luckily the missing party walked out before a search was required.

I consider bushwalking in NSW can be a particularly safe and pleasurable activity. So for those "Bushwalker" readers who are not in a club, remember:

Walk safely - walk with a club

S & R Rescue Practice

Assemble at Mediow Gap

Any member of an affiliated club and invited guests welcome. 8-30 am Saturday start.

Approx. 19 km from Blackheath, follow yellow & black FBW signs in Megalong Valley. Medlow Gap track 2 to 3 km past Old Ford Crossing, but need to be at Water Board gate between 9-30pm and 10-30pm Friday 27th or 7-15am and 8-00am Saturday 28th, to gain access. Conventional vehicles are suitable. Excersise intended to cover bush safety, search techniques, recovery of injured persons, self rescue and safe river crossing techniques. Activities graded to participant's ability, but must expect to camp out. Bring equipment and 2 airbeds per group. Expect to get wet for Sundays activities. Ph. 809-4732 (h).


