Bushwalkers Wilderness Rescue Squad (BWRS) News

BWRS is an active volunteer rescue squad of bushwalkers who have gained some extra skills to make them valuable rescue personnel. Members of BWRS regularly use their bushwalker skills to search remote areas where others struggle. There are times when little happens followed by very busy times. BWRS is very active at the moment.

To hone our search and rescue skills BWRS had a training weekend for newer members on April 18 - 19 in Green Gully. Communication with HF / UHF radios was used to co-ordinate teams to eventually locate a casualty for transport.

These skills will be put to real use on May 1 at Ku-ring-gai Wildflower Gardens, St Ives where members will join other emergency services personnel in a renewed search for a missing elderly woman. NSW Police have new information to test.

BWRS had already planned a training weekend at Mogo Creek on May 2 - 3 to consolidate member competencies when the request came from NSW Police for assistance on May 1. All emergency services personnel follow patterns of competency based training (CBT). You can be assured that emergency services personnel are well trained to perform their tasks and minimise risk to themselves and others.

NavShield on July 4 - 5 is being planned while these other events are happening. An area not far from Sydney (no hints, the location will be given just before the event; no one gets an inside run) is being setup with checkpoint flags as a map and compass navigation training exercise for emergency services personnel. There are many teams, including bushwalking club teams, who keep coming back each to this fabulous event. NavShield is also a great social event not to be missed.

Your club could be there at NavShield with a team in either the one day or overnight event. Checkpoints will be randomly set from very easy to challenging. Your club members could learn / polish up their map & compass skills. You can learn more and register at the BWRS website - www.bwrs.org.au

If you move quickly you may be able to join a St John Ambulance "Provide First Aid" course on May 17. This one day course has been adapted for bushwalkers to gain some useful first aid skills. You will need to register and pay the discounted course fee to confirm your place in this course. Again, see the BWRS website for full details. If you miss our May 17 "Provide First Aid" course then mark your diary for the November 17 course with our bushwalker Instructor.

Finally, planning is well advanced by NSW Police for a combined emergency services exercise at Bendethra for a simulated downed small aircraft. BWRS will be strongly represented. This exercise in rugged country will seek to utilise a range of search skills plus co-ordination liaison between our teams and those from various emergency services.

BWRS is thus an active volunteer rescue squad that values the skills of bushwalkers. BWRS has been assisting NSW Police since 1936 when Paddy Pallin and other prominent bushwalkers set up the NSW Federation of Bushwalking Clubs Search & Rescue Unit. We would like to see more members of bushwalking clubs be part of this worthwhile community asset.

Feral Horses in National Parks

The NPA is helping review the Feral Horse Management plan for Kosciuszko National Park. Matt McClellan has established a comprehensive questionnaire, and is collating the results on behalf of NPA NSW. Although the introduction makes reference to a meeting with the Independent Technical Reference Group (26 March), NPA NSW still have the opportunity to provide that ITRG group with additional information. So far, quite a number of bushwalkers have responded with major concerns about increasing horse numbers, health (water) and safety issues (confrontations with feral horses). New Walking Map for Berowra Valley National Park

A new high quality walking map of the Berowra Valley has been released by local voluntary service group, Friends of Berowra Valley (FBV). The various existing maps of the Park varied in purpose and not all of the features and walks were shown on one map. FBV sought input from NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service, the present managers of the new National Park and many walking authorities to put together the new map. Every approved walking track and fire trail in the Park is shown on the new map, along with easy reference to picnic and camping places, toilets, and historic locations.

The maps are available from the NP&WS shops at Bobbin Head and Lane Cove National Park.
