Hi folks,


I hope everyone has had a chance to enjoy the sunshine lately, it has been perfect walking weather!

Tracks and Access

Blue Mountains National Park - works at Three Sisters

The major upgrade works to the walking track to the Three Sisters at Katoomba are now nearing completion. NPWS have advised that the works on the Three Sisters Track have progressed well and they are delighted to be able to remove the closure barriers for this last weekend. Visitors can now access the track safely from Echo Point, and from the Giant Stairway, which was also re-opened. The official opening date will be the 20th July.

BUSH NAVIGATION for Bushwalkers

REPORT on NAVSHIELD 2015

The 27th annual NavShield of Bushwalkers Wilderness Rescue Squad (BWRS) on 4th / 5th July this year was more successful than usual. BWRS is the search & rescue section of Bushwalking NSW.

BWRS run NavShield as a one day or two day map & compass bush navigation event for bushwalkers and emergency services personnel. Over 400 bushwalkers and emergency services personnel participated this year in teams of between 2 to 6 persons. Saturday morning at 8.44am I had their undivided attention. At 8.45am they could not care less as they rushed to grab their team score card and head bush.

In the months leading up to NavShield, members of BWRS had worked with the Course Setter to place checkpoint flags in a random pattern over an area of around 100 square kilometres.

Teams 'heading bush' aimed to find as many of these checkpoints as they could before the event deadline. It is a challenge each year for BWRS to bring everything together to make NavShield a safe but enjoyable event. We need a huge base site plus maps, team envelopes of checkpoint lists and other notes, toilets, catering, "Bushrangers" (teams of BWRS members with radios to enforce the rules but also call in emergency incidents), radio communications, BWRS admin staff, First Aid & NSW Ambulance Paramedics with good weather if possible.

NavShield is special in several ways.

The NavShield course always has a good mix of easy to hard checkpoints. All level of bushwalking navigators get valuable practice in map & compass navigation.

BWRS has worked hard at making NavShield a safe and social event that welcomes the full range of emergency services. The proof is in the emergency services that attend and Attendance Awards. NavShield regularly has teams from SES, RFS, NP&WS, Defence, VRA and Police. All teams get on well together. Also each year I present awards for regular attendance at NavShield. Over the years of NavShield I have progressively presented awards for 5 years, 10 years, 15 years, 20 years and

now (3x) 25 years of attendance!!

This year everything just clicked together. The base site of the old Yengo homestead in Yengo National Park was a fabulous location. The weather was warm days with cold winter nights. Participants enjoyed the course. Changes of elevation were not great and the small cliff lines broke easily. See the BWRS website for NavShield results at www.bwrs.org.au
