Some of you may be aware of the Adventure Activity Standards (AAS), which were developed in NSW a few years back, by the Outdoor Recreation Industry Council (ORIC). Bushwalking NSW was heavily involved to ensure that the AAS were sensible, voluntary, and would not impose any form of formal

requirements on clubs. Currently, there are national harmonised versions of these guidelines being developed, and Bushwalking NSW will continue to advocate to ensure that these standards remain voluntary, and will not impose any formal requirements on clubs. Having said that, the existing standards do actually provide some useful guidance which you may want to consider drawing on if you're running training for your club or other group. The NSW AAS are available on the ORIC website, oric.org.au/AAS.

I just want to give a shout out to our hard working Executive Officer, Kirsten, who in the midst of moving herself and half our office up to the North Coast so that she can spend more time in the bush, has been scoping up projects that aim to reach out to and provide skills and knowledge to non-club walkers to reduce their impact when walking thus helping to protect the areas we all love and enjoy – and maybe even encourage some into clubs!



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
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Conservation Update

Dear fellow Bushwalkers,

As winter approaches, legislative changes propose a chilling future for nature and biodiversity in our state, while squashing our democratic rights to protest.

6 Reasons for bushwalkers to take notice of recent legislative changes in NSW:



2. Flawed Foundations: The proposed new Biodiversity Conservation Act bases its valuation of the biodiversity of the state on notoriously fallible aerial photography methods of vegetation mapping. The new legislation will require a one size fits all review process for urban, rural and coastal areas alike.



3. <u>Too Local For Our Liking</u>: The new Biodiversity Conservation Act gives more power of decisions about key areas of biodiversity to the local council governments of NSW.

I don't know what it's like in your club, but in my experience of bushwalking clubs in NSW, bushwalkers often walk in areas far away from their home postal code. What does this mean? Not only would we be less likely to find out about development threats to our wild biodiversity sanctuaries before they are approved, but above all as citizens external to the local council, bushwalkers' input is likely to mean much less than under a current system where such things would likely be handled by the NSW government.

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4. Thou Dost Protest Too Much: To compound this issue, newly introduced anti-protest laws mean that when bushwalkers do find out about mining related development proposals in known biodiversity hotspots, that those who stand up to protect them can <u>face prison</u> sentences of up to seven years.

Hugh de Kretser of the Sydney Morning Herald writes that the new laws "give police excessive new powers to stop, search and detain protesters and seize property as well as to shut down peaceful protests that obstruct traffic." George Woods, NSW state coordinator for prominent environmental protection and community advocacy agency **Lock the Gate** calls the laws an "unnecessary overreach by the NSW Government," going on to say that the Government is acting at the "behest of mining companies."



- 5. <u>Uncharitable Status</u>: And speaking of these anti-protest laws... you know all of those conservation and environmental protection agencies you support with your membership, by signing petitions, sending letters to your MP, or by attending protests for a worthy cause? They are all in danger of being strangled financially (excuse the dramatic language). A Statewide investigation threatens to revoke the "charitable organisation" status of groups whose activities interfere with mines in a broad sense.
- 6. Still in the Running: Despite all these dire legislative reforms, environmental groups continue to win protection for our state's precious biodiversity assets. The Environmental Defenders' Office's (EDO) have secured protection for a critical section of habitat for another beautiful endangered creature: the Regent Honeyeater.

Our keynote speaker, Anne McLeod will present:


THE SPIRITED LIFE OF MARIE BYLES

AS THE FIRST WOMAN to practise law in New South Wales, Marie Byles triumphed over a society that viewed women as second-class.

Marie also devoted herself to the conservation of the Australian environment. A dedicated bushwalker, she was a zealous advocate for wilderness and worked to reserve vast areas for national parks. An avid explorer-mountaineer, Marie travelled the world in search of unclimbed mountains and led an international expedition to southern China in 1938.

Marie Byles' life story has powerful narratives about human rights, conservation, ecology, feminism and spirituality, along with the personal fallibilities of a woman determined to be true to herself and her beliefs.

ANZAC Day at Splendour Rock 2015

This year I will again walk to Splendour Rock to remember the bushwalkers who died during WWII. In recent years there has been a short but moving ceremony on ANZAC Day, revived thanks to Jack Cummings of the now defunct Nepean BWC.

There is something special about the night before ANZAC Day. In 2015 I joined others who had walked in separately and set up camp close to Splendour Rock where there was a welcome campfire. There was an extra feeling of camaraderie as we took in the mystical surroundings and thought about the fallen bushwalkers we had come to remember.

Next morning, ANZAC Day, an alarm was not needed as, soon after 5am, there was much activity with people and torches moving through the darkness.



The service began at 6am on a chilly dawn. This year we were fortunate to have a bugler. For the minutes silence we all turned to the east to also then hear The Ode. This year I was given the special honour of reciting The Ode. Belinda Keir who, has done extensive research of the war service of these bushwalkers, read the list of names:

It is almost certain that other walkers who were not club members gave their lives in this conflict and were honoured also. After the service many of us kept looking east as a glorious bright orange ball lit the sky as it slowly crept up from behind Kings Tableland to mark the sunrise.

After the service we returned a different way. It is hard to ever tire of this country around the tracks on Mt Dingo, Mt Merrimerrigal and Mt Warrigal. There is a little bit of everything, passes; vegetation; overhangs etc, to make for an enjoyable bushwalk. How could you not be moved by The Play Ground of the Dingoes on Mt Merri Merrigal?
