Hello everyone,

#### What bird is that?

Do you ever try to find the birds that are calling around you when you are bushwalking? Are you amazed at how quickly birdos can identify birds? With a few tips you can do it too!

I recently learned that the best way to find out about birds is to spend some time with a passionate conservationist, like <u>Rochelle Stevens</u> from the School of Environment, Griffith University, who doesn't just talk about their jizz, she'll let you in on bird sex-life also!



Not clued in on jizz? That's the "general impression of size and shape" of a bird, or other animal or plant. Noting the jizz gives you a great head-start on identification; and then with some anecdotes on the behaviours of that bird, you can have a guess at what they are up to and why they are calling.

The NSW Emergency Services Wilderness Navigation Shield (NavShield), is a rogaine event where teams attempt to gain as many points as possible by finding their way on foot, through unfamiliar wilderness terrain to pre-marked checkpoints. The course covers an area of 80 to 100 square kilometres and only traditional map and compass techniques are permitted. There are both day and overnight event options. The course is set by a team of skilled navigators from the Bushwalkers Wilderness Rescue Squad (the oldest land search and rescue unit in Australia) - the official Search & Rescue arm of Bushwalking NSW.



The course will be set in a secret location (approximately 3 hrs from Sydney) and will take place on the first weekend of July 2016. Encompassing the finest traditions and character of bushwalking, NavShield is an opportunity to get back to basics and work on important navigation skills, without the use of GPS.

It's an ideal training opportunity for your club members to learn and practice in a fun and enjoyable weekend. You can choose to make it as competitive or as amateur/fun as you like!

We ask all bushwalking clubs to please add this great event to their calendars and encourage teams to take part.

NavShield is the primary fundraising activity for <u>BWRS</u>, so come and support your Search and Rescue Squad, whilst promoting a great, fun event to your Clubs. Past events have seen entries from a variety of Bushwalking Clubs and Rogainers, Police, Ambulance, Rural Fire Service, State Emergency Service, Volunteer Rescue Association and the Armed Forces.

#### Like to help manage invasive animals?



The Invasive Animals CRC provide you with a great opportunity to easily contribute to the management of feral animals and conduct some citizen science using their smart phone apps which you can download from: <a href="http://www.feralscan.org.au/">http://www.feralscan.org.au/</a>. Scientists need this kind of data in order to manage these pests. It looks like the information is centralised and supportive of all land managers – that's smart.

They say: "By participating in a collaborative fox control project, you can help landholders in your area to reduce fox numbers and the damage they cause

across your entire region, and help to protect native wildlife from fox predation. Before controlling foxes, it is essential to know a few facts. Mapping where foxes occur, recording what damage they cause, and recording



what control has been undertaken are needed to coordinate control programs, and to address major gaps in our knowledge in Australia. FoxScan needs your advice and experience to help with the fox problem."

The bushwalkers of BWRS are respected by NSW Police as outstanding remote


area search & rescue personnel. BWRS is respected as a valuable community resource. BWRS is
